

In March of 2014, the Lynchburg City Schools Education Foundation established a unique scholarship fund to honor the memory of James K. Candler, a long-time LCS School Board member and **Education Foundation Trus**tee. This fund provides financial assistance to students who are capable of academic excellence but whose demonstrated financial need creates a barrier to educational opportunities while still in the public school learning environment. Since its inception, this fund has supported:

- ♦ 3 students' participation in the National History Day competition
- 3 students' participation in the Junior Theater Festival
- 2 students' enrollment in an 8 week Vector Space class to learn how cars work as teams designed, built, and raced custom nitro-powered RC cars
- ♦ 1 student's enrollment in a career building summer welding class
- ♦ 1 JROTC student's participation in a D-Day Honors Platoon
- ♦ 19 students' enrollment in the Early College Program to earn their Associates Degrees while still in high school



Through the *Tools4Schools* Warehouse, we work to mitigate the out-of-pocket expenses a teacher spends on classroom and student resources and to ensure that ALL students arrive at the bus stop on the first day of school with the supplies they need to be ready to learn! Teachers shop free at our *Tools4Schools* Warehouse for educational materials and classroom rewards and incentives through both onsite and online shopping. Students with verified financial need receive school supplies and backpacks from their school guidance counselors. Thanks to the generous support of grants and financial donations along with the help of school supply drives, extremely dedicated volunteers, and partner organizations, we expanded our outreach over the past year beyond elementary schools to now also include middle and high school students. For the 2017-2018 school year, we provided a total of 1,330 students with school supply kits and 852 with backpacks!

Financial gifts are encouraged and material donations are also welcome. Needed supplies include but are not limited to: quality 3-ring binders, backpacks, colored pencils, crayons, divider pockets, dry erase markers, earbuds, erasers, glue, graphing calculators, highlighters, index cards, markers, pencils, pencil cases, ruled notebook paper, scissors, spiral notebooks, tape, and two pocket folders.
