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Scholarships Advance Student Excellence

Funds raised for this year's scholarship allowed for a \$34.000 award.

The Lynchburg City Schools Education Foundation advances academic excellence through unique scholarship opportunities and is thrilled to announce the return of the Excellence in Science Scholarship! This prestigious \$30,000 scholarship supports top scholars in Lynchburg City Schools and is awarded to a graduating senior for outstanding achievement in science or engineering.

This year's recipient, Chloe Seng, attended the Central Virginia Governor's School for Science and Technology and E.C. Glass High School. She won recognition at local, state, and international science fairs for her research with perovskite solar cells, and completed an internship with Framatome.

Chloe, who now attends the University of Virginia, is continuing to pursue her research in solar energy, said "I am incredibly grateful for the peace of mind that this scholarship has provided and the confidence it has given me moving forward."

Krista Hartmann was the second recipient of the Pryor Scholarship (the predecessor of the Excellence in Science Scholarship) when she graduated from LCS in 2015. Receiving this scholarship helped provide valuable opportunities for Krista, who graduated from the University of Virginia in May 2019. "I have wanted to become a doctor for as long as I can

remember, but I never understood how much my education would cost," says Krista. "The scholarship gave me the opportunity to come closer to achieving my career goals."

While in college, Krista researched antibiotic resistance in an infectious diseases lab. She was chosen as a Global Health Scholar and traveled to Guatemala, where she worked on a public health research project. She double majored in biology and studio art, and was selected as a Miller Arts Scholar. She also volunteered as an EMT with the local rescue squad.

The James K. Candler Opportunity Fund is another significant scholarship which enables

In addition, one Heritage High School student used this scholarship to help attend the National Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America Leadership Conference in California. Caleb Mink earned this honor to compete after winning first place in the Applied Math for Culinary Arts event in Virginia. In the national competition, he took a test of culinary math problems, gave a 5 minute presentation to the judges about yield percent, and responded to judges questions and a list of case studies involving culinary math. Congratulations, Caleb, for winning a silver medal at this national event!

Classroom Innovation Grants Engage Students and Impact Lives

Students who are engaged in stimulating and challenging lessons meet with greater success. Classroom Innovation Grants support a culture of innovation and provide teachers with the opportunity to request grant funding from \$500 to \$5,000 to implement exciting and effective projects and programs for their students. During the 2018-2019 school year, these grants allowed students to learn coding, stay healthy through DrumFit, experience wetlands and watersheds with an Enviroscape model, test the water quality of the James River, explore far away lands through Google Expeditions, and much more. Over the years, some Classroom Innovation Grants have received recognition from state and national organizations, including the Virginia School Board Association. Most recently, one Classroom Innovation Grant partner, Vector Space, represented Lynchburg in this year's national Nation of Makers Conference in Tennessee and took home the award for **Best** Attention to Intentional Inclusion for their work on the 'Empowerment to Employment' hands-on workforce ready project with the Empowerment Academy, Lynchburg Beacon of Hope, and the Lynchburg City Schools Education Foundation. All Classroom Innovation Grants are funded by tax-deductible donations from businesses, foundations, and individuals. 

We thank the over 400 business and community leaders who attended this program, the proceeds from which support the Education Foundation's ongoing programs and projects.



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
